- 1 classical sonata (Haydn, Mozart, Schubert, Beethoven)

- 1 renaissance piece
- 1 concert etude
- one or two pieces from the transcriptions of J.S.Bach's lute, violin or cello compositions
- 1 romantic piece
- 1 piece from the 20th century or a contemporary piece

Violin faculty

- 1 etude
- 1 movement from the Solo sonatas or Partitas by J.S.Bach
- First or final movement of a violin concerto (W.A.Mozart or later concerto)

Ad libitum:

- Slow movement from a violin concerto
- or an other movement from the Solo sonatas or Partitas for violin by J.S.Bach

- or a piece in a different character
- or a virtuoso concert piece
- slow and fast pair of movements from a pre-classical sonata

Viola faculty

- 1 etude
- 1 movement from the Solo sonatas or Partitas by J.S.Bach
- First or final movement of a violin concerto

Ad libitum:

- Slow movement from a violin concerto
- or an other movement from the Solo sonatas or Partitas for violin by J.S.Bach
- or a piece in different character
- or a virtuoso concert piece
- slow and fast pair of movements from a pre-classical sonata

Cello faculty

- 1 etude
- 1 movement from the Cello suites by J.S.Bach
- First or final movement of a cello concerto

Ad libitum:

- an other movement from a cello concerto
- or an other movement from the Cello suites by J.S.Bach
- or a piece in different character
- or a virtuoso concert piece
- slow and fast pair of movements from a pre-classical sonata

Contrabass faculty

- 2 etudes in different characters
- 1 First or final movement of a violin concerto

Ad libitum:

- 1 concert piece
- slow and fast pair of movements from a pre-classical sonata

Recorder faculty

A 20th-21st century solo work or etude (suggested authors: F. Brüggen, H. U. Staeps, H. M. Linde, M. Zahnhauser, Gábor Kerek)

- Slow and fast movement of a Baroque concerto (suggested authors: Vivaldi, Telemann, Sammartini)
- Early Baroque work, or two movements of a grand baroque sonata with different characters (proposed authors: Castello, Fontana, Cima, Telemann, Handel, Marcello, Mancini, Barsanti)
- A freely chosen work in a different style than before

Flute faculty

- 2 Etudes with different characters
- 1 Slow and fast movement of a Baroque sonata
- 1 slow and fast movement of classical or preclassical concerts performed without sheet music
- 1 Performance piece

Oboe faculty

- Two Etudes of Different Characters (proposed authors: Schmitt, Wiedemann, Nazarov, Mille)
- Slow and Fast movement of a Baroque concerto (suggested authors: Handel, Telemann)
- J.Haydn: Concerto I in C major with cadence

- A romantic or twentieth-century work of your choice. (suggested authors: Schumann, Ránki, Britten, Bozza)

Clarinet faculty

- an etude from Klose's Characteristic Etudes
- an etude of your choice
- fast and slow movements of a concerto, or Concertino
- a sonata movement or performance piece

Saxophone faculty

Major - minor notes and their tertzary marches, triads, dominant septim and narrowed septim chords and their resolutions

Etude:

- Ferling/Mule 48 Etudes Nos. 2 and Nr. 25
- an arbitrary etude of a different style

A concerto or sonata of your choice

A performance piece of your choice in a different style (solo or piano accompaniment)

Performing one of the works without sheet music is mandatory

Bassoon faculty

- Two Etudes with Different Characters (Milde: Concert Etudes)
- Slow and fast movement of a Baroque concerto
- Quick movement of a classical concerto
- 1 movement of a romantic or modern work

Horn faculty:

- Maxim Alphonse: Vol. III, Etude No. 7
- J. von Gallay: Etude No. 7, Op. 57
- First movement of any classical concerto with cadence, and slow movement of an arbitrary concerto
- The styles of the two concertos must be different

Trumpet faculty

- fast and slow movements of a baroque sonata or fast movements of a classical concerto (trumpet concertos by J. Haydn, J. N. Hummel, J. B. Neruda)
- a XX-XXI century. century performance piece (sonata, solo work, trumpet concerto)

Trombone faculty

- Blazsevics: Etude No. 22, or an arbitrary Bordogni melodic etude
- a slow and fast movement of a Baroque sonata
- 2 movements of a classical concerto (slow-fast) or any concert or performance piece

Tuba faculty

Solfege

Written Tasks

- two-voice dictation (baroque or Viennese classical style)
- monophonic dictation (from the music of the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries)
- interval test (10 interval and triads mixed) write the name of the interval and triads

Vocal Tasks

- blatting (short baroque, Viennese classical, simple romantic, 20th century melody)

Music theory

Written task

- notation of the soprano and bass part of Bach's chorale or harmonic dictation, naming the harmonies

Task at the piano

- playing a complex authentic close on the piano (in major, minor 4#, up to 4b)
- harmonic dictation
- knowledge of altered chords

Folkmusic

- singing a folk song from your own nation

<u>Piano</u>

(except piano faculty)

Presentation of 4 pieces in 4 different styles. Of these, one Bach work and one Viennese classical work (sonata movement or sonatina) are obligatory.
